¹⁴ For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility,¹⁵ by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace,¹⁶ and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility.¹⁷ He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near.¹⁸ For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit.

¹⁹ Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household,²⁰ built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone.²¹ In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord.²² And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

Media headlines, increasingly it seems, focus more and more upon the 'so called' failure of people in high places falling foul of our sense of morality; in government, in business or in a myriad other situations.

As we read the headlines, and listen to so many peoples' opinions of what this or that person has done or has not done, are we right to think, 'what is the world coming to'?

And then we might also ask, who it is that is setting the rules as to how any of us should behave, either in public office or indeed in society in general.

Have we abandoned the rule book for a free-for-all.

But then again, who writes the rule book?

If we look into the Bible, be that Old or New Testament, we see continually that one rule book was paramount, the fact that God rules, and His rule is a rule of love.

The problem with mankind setting (or failing to set) the rules is that no one can seem to get them right.

On the contrary, the rule book set by God was (and still is) set by one who sees everything, including the nature of humankind and through lovingkindness has set out a way to safety.

Of course, no one likes rules imposed, and everyone at sometime or other believes that they know better, or that they don't apply to themselves - but see what became of the Israelite nation when they decided they knew better, or those down the years - secular or sacred - when they also felt the same.

But, there is a way to solve this dilemma. Scripture reveals how human character apart from God is flawed and corrupted by sin. From the beginning, the Bible teaches how our sinful nature separates us from God and makes human character selfish and rebellious.

The early saints knew this and sought to live it; and you and I are called to do likewise.

We may not save the world from itself, but we can certainly show them Someone who can.
